## Francesco Sindico, University of Strathclyde

Francesco Sindico is a Professor of International Law at the University of Strathclyde Law School, currently on secondment (until April 2024) with the Scottish Government where he leads the Carbon Neutral Islands project and is the Islands Team liaison officer for Shetland Islands. He is the Founder of the Strathclyde Centre for Environmental Law and Governance (SCELG) and Founder and Director of the Climate Change Litigation Initiative (C2LI), which was launched at COP26.

He leads the EILEAN initiative at SCELG, an effort to better understand how island communities engage with legal and political processes to promote resilience and sustainability. Francesco has collaborated with the Scottish Government in the implementation of the Islands (Scotland) Act 2018 by providing technical advice to the consultation leading to the National Islands Plan and working on guidance related to island communities impact assessment. Amongst other island related work, Francesco is currently collaborating with the University of the Aegean and Island Innovation in a study commissioned by Volkswagen on the community perception of the public-private e-mobility project on the Greek island of Astypalea. Francesco is also the Co-Chair of the International Union for the Conservation of Nature (IUCN) World Commission on Environmental Law (WCEL) Climate Change Law Specialist Group where he is developing a project on islands and net zero policies. Francesco has collaborated with Island Innovation in the Islands and Covid-19 survey that has collated data from islands in 53 countries, which was then followed in 2021 by the COVID-19 Island Insight Series which, together with the University of Prince Edward Island and Island Innovation, presented more in depth studies from 24 islands. Finally, he has been leading since 2018 Island Explorers, a sustainability education project aimed at primary school pupils, which is being used to build similar projects across island based schools in Europe through the EU Islands project.

Francesco is a Public International Lawyer by training and has over ten years of experience providing legal advice to international organisations and national governments in the fields of climate change law, international water law and sustainable development law and policy. He was Counsel for the Plurinational State of Bolivia before the UN International Court of Justice in the case over the status of the waters of the Silala against Chile. Francesco speaks four languages (English, Italian, Spanish and French) and was trained in Italy and Spain.
